Students that graduate in the next five years may work at jobs that do not even exist today. The workplace is becoming increasingly complex, requiring students to develop a range of competencies, such as critical thinking, solving complex problems and collaborating with others.

Key ideas:

- The *Ministerial Order on Student Learning (#001/2013)* outlines the following 10 competencies:



- Teachers are learning how to help all students become aware of, and develop, these 10 competencies.
- Over the next few years, all students in every grade, subject and discipline area will shift to a focus on competencies. Students will continue to learn content in subject areas; however, there will be more emphasis on applying knowledge.
- A focus on competencies will help students connect their learning to real-life situations, encouraging them to be more flexible and resourceful life-long learners.

Questions for reflection and discussion:

- What challenges might the shift to a focus on competencies present?
- What opportunities might a focus on competencies provide students?
- How might real-world learning opportunities support the development of competencies?
- What is your child's teacher and/or school community doing to support competency development?
